FIRST POINT PLEASANT PRODUCTION RESULTS RELEASED

OGS APRIL MEETING TO FEATURE GARY PERRY SPEAKING ON THE IMPACT OF FAULTS ON FRACING

Happy springtime to all!

Our meeting last month at the OOGA Winter Meeting drew record attendance. By all accounts, Matt Hammond's talk was informative and stimulating. The talk could be described as a "broad overview," and I particularly appreciated his frac slides. Chesapeake controls 1.3 million net acres in the Ohio Utica play, 490,000 of which they consider in the "core" of the play. According to Matt, Chesapeake's leasehold accounts for one-half of the Utica/Point Pleasant productive acreage. This was a surprise since Wickstrom reported 10 million potential productive acres in the Utica/Point Pleasant of Ohio and leasing by at least 20 companies would support his interpretation. Only time will tell.

The highlight of new production data released this month, is Chesapeake's Buell 8H in Harrison County which reported more than 1.5 BCF of gas and 13,500 bbl of oil over 198 days. Chesapeake released production on 9 wells in Carroll, Harrison, Mahoning and Portage counties.

You will not want to miss this month's OGS meeting on April 21st when Gary Perry of Geotrace, will be giving a presentation entitled: *Detecting faults and fractures that you couldn't see before and their impact on fracing and injection decisions*. DETECTING FAULTS AND FRACTURES THAT YOU COULDN'T SEE BEFORE AND THEIR IMPACT ON FRACING AND INJECTION DECISIONS

Gary Perry, VP Reservoir Services, Geotrace

As we concentrate more and more on exploiting resource plays with horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracturing, it is imperative that we learn all we can from our seismic data. Before beginning a large-scale drilling program in an area it is now possible to image natural fracture swarms, faults (even very small ones) and the sweetest, highest TOC rock.

There are pressures from many directions that require we know all of the above. Many folks are concerned about groundwater contamination from fracing and also the earthquakes that have been triggered from poorly-placed injection wells. And, as has been demonstrated in almost every resource play so far, a majority of wells drilled have proven to be sub-economic. All of these aspects of the resource plays can be impacted in a positive manner by taking full advantage of all that seismic data has to offer.

Examples will be shown of bandwidth extension to image faults and fractures and pre-stack inversion to determine rock properties.



Biography

Gary Perry has been in the industry since 1974 and studied Geology with emphasis on Geophysics at the University of Texas during his early career. He is currently Vice President, Reservoir Services for Geotrace and has been with the company for over 25 years. Gary was previously with Geo-Search Corporation from 1974 to 1986 where he performed basin velocity studies in several onshore U.S. basins before going into seismic processing and then reservoir studies.
