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WICKSTROM STEPS DOWN AS CHIEF OF THE OHIO DIVISION OF GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

Our May meeting began with an announcement by Mac Swinford that Larry Wickstrom was stepping down as Chief of the Ohio Division of Geological Survey and State Geologist. Mac will serve in the interim while a search is conducted to fill the position. Larry has been an active member of the Ohio Geological Society for the nearly 30 years that he has worked for the Survey. He has been an exemplary Chief, embodying the rare combination of technical and administrative expertise, and the ability to get things done. Larry is well known and well regarded by his peers throughout the country. The geologic community has been concerned about the Survey since their severe budget cuts in 2008 when Larry stepped-up and committed to finding other sources of income to support the Survey. According to Swinford, closing of the Survey was being discussed at that time. Larry has accomplished a great deal for the people of Ohio, and we are concerned about the future of the Ohio Geological Survey without his leadership.

Also at our May meeting, William Scott and Charles Allard of Baker Hughes Coring gave a great review of the coring challenges and successes in the Utica/Point Pleasant of Ohio. Baker Hughes has cored 16 wells in Ohio's Utica-Point Pleasant in 15 counties since 2009 and they remain very active. Core barrels up to 120 feet long have been used with good recovery percentages. According to Mr. Allard, with proper planning the Utica-Point Pleasant is a core friendly interval. Our next meeting will be in November with the speaker to be announced later. Remember our annual golf outing at Chapel Hill has been moved to September 13th and the AAPG Eastern Section Meeting is September 22-26.

Registration is now live online for the Eastern Section AAPG Meeting to be held at the Renaissance Cleveland Hotel. The Ohio Geological Society is hosting this national event and the organizing committee has been doing a world class job putting it all together. OGS May Meeting....



Theodore A. "Ted" DeBrosse (1930-2012)

Ted DeBrosse, who died on May 21, 2012, was long time and distinguished employee of Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). Ted was born on June 25, 1930, and was a 1955 graduate of St. Joseph's College, where he majored in geology. Ted DeBrosse started out his career with the ODNR-Division of Geological Survey in the Coal Geology Section. He was first assigned to the statewide program to calculate coal resources, which was ongoing during the 1950's and early 1960's. As part of this effort, he published a Report of Investigation on the coal resources of the Conemaugh Formation of Ohio.

Starting in 1957, Ted DeBrosse was transferred to the Subsurface Section of the Division of Geological Survey. It was here that he began to make a significant contribution to the oil and gas industry of Ohio. Late in 1957, Ted DeBrosse was placed in charge of a project to map the locations of all known oil and gas wells in Ohio. This had never before been done publicly. The project was completed in 1960, just in time for the maps to be heavily used by the public for the Morrow County, Ohio oil boom of the early 1960's. Ted DeBrosse continued to be involved in updating the maps all during the Morrow County boom, never allowing the maps to become out of date during a time when there was large number of wells being permitted and drilled.

In addition, during the period of the late 1950's and early 1960's, Ted DeBrosse became involved in two other activities, the Oil and Gas Fields Map of Ohio and the annual oil and gas statistics. Ted DeBrosse was the co-author on the 1960 Oil and Gas Fields of Ohio map, assisted with mapping of the 1964 Oil and Gas Fields Map, and in 1974, he was the principle author on the 1974 Oil and Gas Fields of Ohio map. The 1974 map served the public for 22 years, until it was updated in 1996. In 1959, Ted DeBrosse started his involvement in the compiling the annual oil and gas statistics for Ohio. He was a co-author for the annual statistics for 1958, 1959, 1964, and 1968, and he was the primary author for the annual oil and gas statistics from 1969 until 1986. This statistical report became known to the industry as "The DeBrosse Report".

Finally, Ted DeBrosse was best known and distinguished himself during his employment with the former ODNR-Division of Oil and Gas. During the Morrow County oil boom of the early 1960's, it became apparent that Ohio's oil and gas laws were inadequate to safely manage the Morrow County oil field. Ted DeBrosse worked with the legislature and industry to help modernize Ohio's oil and gas laws. As part of this modernization, the Division of Oil and Gas was created in October 1965. Ted DeBrosse transferred over from the Division of Geological Survey to the newly created Division of Oil and Gas, thereby becoming one of the first employees. Over time, he eventually became Assistant Chief of the Division. On three occasions, in 1975, 1975-1977, and in 1983, he was acting Chief of the Division. During his tenure as acting Chief, he initiated and established the idle and orphan well program for the Division. This allowed the Division to finance the plugging and restoration of wells when no one could be found to assume these costs.

Professionally, Ted was a founding member of both the Ohio Geological Society and the Ohio Section of the American Institute of Professional Geologists (AIPG), and was a member of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG) for over 50 years. He served as the president and was awarded Honorary Membership by the Ohio Geological Society, served as president of the Ohio Section of AIPG, and was inducted into the Ohio Oil and Gas Association Hall of Fame.

Even in retirement, Ted still remained active. He could be seen around ODNR up until the late 2000's, meeting old colleagues and his son Myron for lunch. He would also join people from the oil and gas industry for Friday morning coffee in Worthington. He was survived by wife of 54 years, Betty; children, Richard (Martha) of SC, Myron, Jeffrey (Maryan), and Nanette DeBrosse, all of Columbus; and his grandchildren, Abigail and Michael DeBrosse.

ODNR releases new *Ohio Rocks!* license plate *Proceeds will support earth science education in Ohio*

COLUMBUS, OH – The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), Division of Geological Survey is pleased to announce the availability of a new license plate that will fund further research and outreach on the state’s geology.

Sales of the new *Ohio Rocks!* license plates will benefit a newly created Earth Science Education and Outreach Fund. The new fund will issue a number of grants to earth science students at Ohio colleges and universities each year for research on the geology of Ohio.

“These funds will help train a new generation of geologists getting degrees in Ohio,” says Mac Swinford, interim chief of the Division of Geological Survey. “With these grants, young people can study, and perhaps answer, questions about Ohio geology beyond what the Division of Geological Survey can perform.”

A portion of the funds also will be dedicated to providing educational outreach to Ohio’s K–12 schools in support of earth science. For example, funding can be used to help continue the Division’s very popular [rock-and-mineral kit program](#).

It is anticipated that this funding will benefit a wide spectrum of Ohioans, from users of state parks, sportsmen, educators and homeowners to the extractive industries. The plate has been designed with what is hoped to be a very popular graphic to appeal to a large percentage of Ohioans. The slogan “Ohio Rocks!” is meant to have a double meaning—pointing to both the beauty of Ohio’s geology and the message that Ohio is a great place to live.
